#### Tips to keep in mind when creating your video:

- 1. The video can be no longer than 60 seconds. The 5-second title slide does not count towards the limit.
- 2. Don't speed up your audio or talk faster to fit more content in the 60 second time limit.
- 3. As you are creating text for your video, check and correct any typos, spelling, and grammatical errors.
- 4. Make sure you cite resources used (music, images, video clips, etc.) and that they are copyright & royalty free.
- 5. The FAQ page has answers to many of the questions you may have while creating your video.

#### **Narrow Your Focus**

The three global topics are broad and encompass a lot of challenges, but your video can only be 60 seconds. Rather than taking on the entire topic, we recommend focusing on one part of the topic (a subtopic).

**Example:** Rather than tackling the entire topic of energy, consider focusing in on the subtopic of energy access.

#### **Gather Credible Information**

Good videos are based on accurate information. Dozens of videos are disqualified every year because they use incorrect data, outdated facts, or unreliable sources. Click the blue box below for a helpful resource from the Meriam Library at California State University, Chico to evaluate your sources.

#### Is my source credible?

As you are researching, make sure to keep track of where you are getting your information. Note the title, author, organization, publication date, and website URL of the sources you use for your video. If your video is selected as a finalist, we will ask for a copy of your cited sources. You can choose the citation style MLA, APA, etc. but your citations should be more than a list of websites. You are welcome to also include these citations at the end of your video but it is not required at this time.

You can use the Topic Backgrounders to begin gathering information, but you will also need to do some of your own research.

#### **Connect to Population Growth**

It isn't enough to say "more people will mean more pollution." You'll need to highlight a specific way that human population growth impacts your topic, using specific data or facts to support your claim.

**Example:** "As the human population grows, so does the demand for fish and shellfish, which is a major source of protein for people around the world. The ocean can't produce an ever-increasing amount of seafood. There is an upper limit to the amount of fishing that can maintain a sustainable yield."

#### What is a Sustainable Solution?

- Works to actively reduce your topic challenge without creating new issues or harming future generations.
- Identifies and listens to the needs and perspectives of all stakeholders.
- Goes beyond making donations to charity.
- Can be new or existing but is realistic and makes sense.

The United Nations defines sustainable development as a multi-faceted approach to problem solving that balances economic, social, and environmental needs.

#### Make sure your sustainable solution directly addresses your specific topic challenge and is rooted in research.

For example: If your subtopic is microplastics in rainfall, recycling shouldn't be your solution because there isn't a clear link between how individuals recycling at home will prevent microplastics from getting into rain. A more direct solution would be to install filters in wastewater plants to filter microplastics out of water before it evaporates.



#### **Edit Your Video**

You don't need fancy software to edit your video. There are tons of free programs and apps to edit on your computer or your phone.

#### Things to remember:

- Make sure you include a <u>title slide</u> at the beginning with the lead producer's name, school name, school city/state/country, title of video, and total running time (not counting the 5-second title card).
- Make sure your video is 60 seconds or less. Videos that are too long will be disqualified. Don't speed up your audio to fit more content in the 60 second time limit.
- Make sure that everything is spelled correctly.
- If using images and/or music, make sure that they are not copyrighted and that you cited <u>Creative Commons</u> or other non copyrighted resources as requested by the author.

#### Have your prepped the applicable permission forms to participate in the contest?

You will need to upload a signed <u>permission form</u> with your submission if you are in middle school or under 13 in the United States or if you are located outside the United States. Additional permission forms will be required if your video is selected as a finalist.

#### Before you submit your final video make sure:

- Title screen including the lead producer's name, school name, school city/state/country, title of your video, run time of your video (not including the title screen). Here is an optional **title screen template** you can use.
- Does your video connect how human population growth impacts your topic?
- Does your video offer at least one sustainable solution?
- Is your video 60 seconds or less (not including title screen)?
- Did you check for spelling and grammatical errors on any text that appears in your video?
- Did you check if your images and music are copyright-free and cite other sources based on the authors' requests?
